

Welcome Back!

Wow, when we miss a day of school it sure feels like I haven't seen the Kindergarten class for a while. Even with missing a day here and there, I'm so proud of the class and their wonderful progress. They're moving along nicely and learning a lot.

Thank you for setting up time in the evenings to read with your child. Reading books aloud to children stimulates their imagination and expands their understanding of the world. It helps them develop language and listening skills and prepares them to understand the written word. Even though I'm sending home books for your child to read to you, it's still important for you to read aloud to them as well.

We're also moving along nicely with counting and have moved from 20 to 30. Just another friendly reminder to have your child think about how mathematics is everywhere in our everyday life. Ask them questions, then listen and let them lead the conversation. They may notice patterns of tiles, geometric configurations, relationships between size and costs. Have them look around and notice where they see numbers, you'll be surprised yourself how much we take for granted. Make your next trip to the grocery store a Math Adventure and play "I spy my little eye" using numbers. Talking math builds excellent connections that can help them throughout their schooling years. Why wait, make math fun now and watch their skills bloom.

Math: Grade 7: Fractions, Decimals, Percents. Grade 8: Percent, Ratio, Rate. Test on Monday.


Science: preparing for our classes Science Fair, monthly STEM activities.
